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ARTISTS

RAFAEL DRUIAN, Violin

Renowned conductor-violinist RAFAEL DRUIAN spent the first twenty-five years of his career as concert-master of leading U.S. orchestras: Dallas and Minnesota under Dorati; Cleveland under Szell and the New York Philharmonic under Boulez. Now, in addition to conducting and playing, he also gives numerous residencies and teaches.

He made his New York conducting debut in the summer of 1977 in Lincoln Center's Mostly Mozart Festival and he was also the violin soloist. In the fall of 1983, he will conduct and play with The Israel Chamber Orchestra. Mr. Druian has been guest soloist and/or conductor with the Symphony Orchestras of Cleveland, Pittsburgh, Detroit, Atlanta, Utah, Phoenix, San Diego and Hartford and has performed a number of chamber orchestra concerts with the National Symphony at the Kennedy Center. He has also performed numerous chamber music concerts with colleagues in places such as the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York and the Library of Congress.

Rafael Druian gave his first New York recital in 1950. Among his many recordings are acclaimed performances with George Szell of four Mozart piano-violin sonatas; sonatas by Bartok and Charles Ives with John Simms, pianist; and Mozart's Sinfonia Concertante with Abraham Skernick, violist, and The Cleveland Orchestra under Szell. The latter received a 1964 Grammy Award Nomination as the best classical recording of the year. On May 4, 1973, Mr. Druian gave the world premiere of Benjamin Lees' Sonata in collaboration with Ilse von Alpenheim in Washington, D.C. This was recorded by Desto Records.

Rafael Druian began his career as concertmaster with the Dallas Symphony in 1947-48. He also served in this capacity with the Orchestras of Minnesota and Cleveland and in the fall of 1971 he joined the New York Philharmonic. He appeared as soloist with that Orchestra on several occasions, performing the Mozart Violin Concerto K. 219 and the Mozart Sinfonia Concertante, K. 364, both with Pierre Boulez conducting, and the Hindemith Violin Concerto under Aldo Ceccato.

These performances begin Mr. Druian's forth season as an Artist Member with ESPRIT.

STEPHEN KRAEMER, Horn

Mr Kraemer was born in San Gabriel, California and began studying the french horn in 1965 with Ralph Pyle, french horn of the Los Angeles Philharmonic and the Los Angeles Brass Quintet. Later he received his Bachelors of Music and Masters of Music Degrees at the Cleveland Institute while studying with Myron Bloom, the principal horn of the Cleveland Orchestra.

As one of the founding members of Esprit, he is a regular soloist on our series as well as having appeared with the San Antonio Symphony, the Lake Placid Sinfonietta and the University Circle Orchestra under the baton of James Levine.

Presently Mr. Kraemer is the hornist of Esprit and principal hornist of the San Antonio Symphony.

BENJAMIN PASTERNAK, Piano

Mr. Pasternak began his study of the piano at the age of four and gave his first public performance at the age of eight. At the age of thirteen he won a scholarship to the Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia where he continued his studies until graduating in 1975 at the age of eighteen. His teachers have included Mieczyslaw Horszowski, Rudolf Serkin, Seymour Lipkin, Leon Fleisher and Leonard Shure.

He has won many prizes and awards including the Youth Contest of the Philadelphia Orchestra and the C.D. Jackson Award for outstanding achievement at Tanglewood. Mr. Pasternak has appeared as soloist with the Philadelphia Orchestra and the St. Louis Symphony, and in recital at the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C., Jordan Hall in Boston, and the Walnut Street Theatre in Philadelphia.

Along with his performances with Esprit this season, he will be performing with the Boston and Hartford Symphony Orchestras.
